




A fry-up for the kids was followed by cooking the catch for the adults, supplemented by fish, compliments of Garry. Celebrations continued into the evening.



So, after many, many months we are nearly there. The excavation was completed only to learn the concreter laying the slab was now delayed by six weeks. Luckily, we found another contractor who could step in. Dincell then set the tank up and poured the concrete and the roof. Following that we had the inside joints cold sealed as double protection against any leaks. Kim Higgins will now install all the electrical and technical bits and reconnect it back into our system.





We will need to backfill the site and put in drainage, which Keith and Alan are doing in conjunction with Kim, followed by landscaping. Then the club system will be back in action, hopefully for the next 40 years. Thank you to Vice Commodore Bruce Quick who stepped in to oversee the contractors as Briar and I headed to Tassie in the middle of the build!

Now we are turning our attention to the driveway down to the kiosk, so they can finally get deliveries back down there, which means we can move their storage container out of the upper carpark. Then it's removing the mess that has been dumped on what is to be the overflow carpark, which is where this whole project started, seal the carpark and install a boom gate to keep the public out.
