Rear Commodore Paul Purnell and Donna Paredes did a great job drumming up prizes for both the raffle and auction. Kobi Simat ran the auction and with avid bidding we sold the lot. Well done to all who took part and of course the actual winners.



This year we auctioned a stay at KMYC Coal & Candle Cottage, lunch at Pete's Bite, a week's stay in Queensland donated by Alex Burt, a cruise with Sydney Classic Boat Charters (John Spry's Kalinda) including catering from Cottage Point Kiosk, Dinner for 8 at Royal Sydney Yacht Squadron and a grazing table for 40 from Rukus Catering.

My thanks this year go to John Spry and Jenny Redstone for hosting the Commodores on the salute boat Kalinda. We had at least 20 boats in the Sail Past, which compared to other yacht clubs, sets us well ahead, not to mention giving the saluting arm a good workout. Other Opening Days

While we invite Flag Officers from other yacht clubs to our Opening Day, our flag offices are invited to other clubs, so it's a merry circle of visiting in September and October. This year we clashed with St George Motor Boat Club and with only so many weekends we are not able to attend them all.

The events range from very formal, such as at those clubs with 'Royal' in their title, with navy representatives and requisite speeches, to the more informal. I can say that we are the only yacht club to have a full sit-down lunch and then have all members and guests going out on the boats, which is why our Opening Day is so popular.

While other yacht clubs may have many more members, they don't out number us in boats in the sail past. Also, our club does not have lavish dining rooms and restaurants open to the public, so our opening day is for all members, whereas other clubs often only get a corner of a clubroom while other members are at the bar or dinning, so I consider our event to be very special family fun day.





Of course there are other differences too. **Royal Sydney Yacht Squadron** held their Opening Day in a marquee on their waterfront. The sail past consisted of boats passing in front of the marina accompanied by the firing of a CANNON. As an invited guest I got fire it off once. We gotta get one of those!!!









Post that excitement guests could dine at one of the restaurants. Briar and I joined Squadron/KMYC members Graeme and Sharron Kennedy for lunch and caught up with other joint members Richard and Renee Chapman and Alex and Carolyn Bert.

Bobbin Head Cruising Club is based in Empire Marina but has no clubhouse or office there. They were able to find a marina berth for me as Lionheart is away being refitted in Queensland, so we motored down from Cottage Point.

We were allocated to Bruce and Ngaire's new boat, which hosted the Commodores and headed out to where the sail past near Apple Tree Bay, then a cruise down Smiths Creek before returning to Bobbin Head and drinks aboard.





Once the Café had closed for the day to the public it was set up for a sit-down dinner and formalities.

Guest speaker the Hon Jim Lloyd gave us an overview of his time as First Officer, then Skipper, on the cruise ship Lady Hawkesbury.

With 62 cabins carrying 212 guests it was the only cruise ship to ply the Hawkesbury River and Cowan Creek. He said seeing the 68m vessel up the end of Smiths Creek was quite a sight. He rang the bell as pictured with Commodore Grant Cunnigham to open

Messages from Keith

Parking at the waterfront is only for unloading and is subject to a maximum of 5 minutes. Please do not leave cars unattended.

Tinnies are provided but are subject to maximum usage of 20 minutes. If you are going to be longer than that out to your boat please use the white dinghy.

Many of you have now switched from the club 27 Meg radio channel 94 to the VHF channel 73. A reminder that you do need a licence to operate a VHF and Marine Rescue run courses to get you qualified, so if you are using one and are not licenced look out for the next course.

On the waterfront we monitor both bands so that means we have to use 2 radios. So as an aid to waterfront staff when calling up for a pickup can you please identify which radio you are using so they call you back on the right one.

In my case it would be *KMYC Base this is Cocktail III calling on 27 Meg channel 94* or if using VHF it would be *KMYC Base this is Cocktail III calling on VHF channel 73* By following this the waterfront will get back to you quickly on the right radio.

Driveway & Overflow Carpark

We are done!

The carpark itself was ready so we were able to use it on Opening Day. Since then we have done the line markings and now added bumpers to stop cars driving into the wall. The boom gate has been installed and your club fob will open it. We have turned on the cameras and are ready for action.



Why do we need cameras? Well surely it won't take long for someone to drive through the boom gate and we need the licence plate number in order to pursue the culprit for the repairs.

Trent has moved his container out of the main carpark back down next to the Kiosk and he and Angela can once again park down there, so we have more space back in the main carpark. The Kiosk is able to buzz the boom gate open for their delivery trucks.

Trent has already had compliments from some of his customers about the new carpark prior to us turning on the boom gate and had others buzz for entry for the Kiosk! So next on the list is a "Members Only' sign. (Sorry Trent). Kieth has now erected the safely rail around the carpark and the achievers will finalise the landscaping and painting of the envirocycle tank.

These projects have taken many years longer than we had hoped due to covid delays and changes in priorities. I thank the Board and Kieth for all the support in getting this work done, and members for their patience. Now onto the next projects.

Up coming Projects the Board is looking at

As I have mentioned we always have maintenance, some big, some small. The ever-changing regulations we must comply with require additions and upgrades to protect you and the club. As a Borad we must balance these against our income and need to prioritise and budget into the future.

So currently we have a few discussions underway.

We need to stabilise the flooring of the Shipwright Cottage Point Boat Shed. You may remember the photo I included a few newsletters ago of a support beam that had rotted, which of course is not a simple job and we have had engineers and architects look into it. This is linked to the Inundation Report which council sent, suggesting we needed to raise the floor. In doing that we would need to raise the Kiosk (or limit the shipwright workforce to workers under 3 foot tall). Following architect and engineer reports the cost of raising the building, including the Kiosk, is beyond the club's finances, so we are pursuing other ideas.

One idea is to use the space beside the shipwright, on other side of the Kiosk, to build a new raised deck with shipwright workspace there, leaving the current one for storage only. Investigation continues.

Recently we were visited by representatives from our local council, always an exciting moment, who have begun inspections of all slipways. Luckly Garry Sexton had already been looking into ours. When anti fouling is done the waste cannot go into the waterway. We have an outdated treatment area, drains and pump-out that do not meet new EPA regulations. Garry already had a report done by ISCA and as was able to show council this, along with Board meeting minutes, proving we are already aware of issue and are working to address it. We now have a proposal that will bring us back up to date and will discuss this at the next Board meeting, but it has become a priority in order to continue operation of the slipway.

Also needed is more underground distribution for the envirocycle. Older piping currently runs under the main lawn in front of the clubhouse, but we will look to run some down the banks and longerterm level out more of the lawn area, eliminating the need to use the sprinkler system above ground.

While the clubhouse is a wonderful building it is no longer big enough for many of our events and some of you may have seen a marquee on the lawn for weddings. We would like to extend the

clubhouse balcony out over the existing paved seating area between Keith's cottage and the driveway to the waterfront. This would be big enough to take a marquee and also have opening doors into the clubhouse where the current honour boards are. Doing this would give us a spectacular balcony for events and weddings, effectively doubling the clubhouse capacity. It would also provide a panic-free wet weather option for future club opening days.
